Treatment Using the Naturopathic Method

Dr. Luke Huber, who practices Naturopathic Medicine in Salem, N.H., was introduced by Steve Goddu.

Naturopathic medicine is a system of primary healthcare and naturopathic physicians are primary healthcare practitioners whose techniques include modern and traditional scientific and empirical methods.

Naturopathic medicine is not new, but it is not common in New England. It was more common up until the 1920s when antibiotics, pain relievers and surgery became more popular.

The education is similar to other medical sciences with a four-year pre-medical program and four years of medical school with the last two years spent with clinic and alternative medical therapies. The student has the option of taking a residency at a hospital.

Naturopathic physicians are locally licensed in New

 Hampshire, Vermont and Maine and in a number of west coast states as primary care physicians.

The treatments are more gradual than the results one might receive through medication.

The naturopathic doctor is not a primary care physician, but rather a consultant in this area.

Dr. Huber realizes that there are benefits of using traditional medicine and naturopathic medicine together.

Medical insurance coverage for naturopathic treatments depends on each state’s law and, sometimes, by the state’s commissioner of insurance.

Our thanks to Dr. Huber for introducing us to this area of medicine.
